Message From Mayor Neff

It seems every month brings news both great and sad to Little Silver, and February was no different.

At the beginning of the month, we lost one of Little Silver's great, true-blue citizens, George A. Darragh Jr. George had been a member of the Borough Council, served as Council President, and finished his last term as Mayor.

He was also a founding member of the Little Silver EMS, a life member of the Fire Department, a former president of the Board of Health, and taught CPR throughout Monmouth County.

And he somehow found time for a paying job as well: for 30 years, Mr. Darragh was a beloved biology teacher at Monmouth Regional High School. If we had the space, we'd tell you more.

George's life of service is the stuff of legend. We thank the Darragh family for sharing him with us, and extend our condolences to his wife Phyllis and son Scott.

Mayor Darragh will be missed, but in his tradition of public service, we hope that he would be pleased to hear that plans to install a new, 95-foot communications tower at Borough Hall are proceeding, as we move forward with a critical safety improvement.

The current tower is 62 feet tall, including its antennae, but is so old and out of date that a communications consultant recently refused to climb it for safety reasons. More importantly, it is simply inadequate, creating "dead zones" around town where our emergency radios suddenly go silent.

The new tower will fix that dangerous condition. It will serve the Police, Fire Department, EMS, Department of Public Works, and State Police and County hot-

lines. In addition, its cost will be borne by Verizon, which will then lease space for cell platforms to enhance local phone service as well, for an enormous cost saving and continued financial benefit.

Next, in some good news for Little Silver and the region, we received word in February of a \$900,000 grant from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to address the impacts of coastal hazards and storm surge in our area.

The grant, the result of an application by the Two River Council of Mayors, will partner the Department of Environmental Protection, the Jacques Cousteau National Estuarine Research Reserve, the Louis Berger Group, the Rutgers Climate Institute and the Borough of Oceanport as the representative of the Two River Council in a project that will define the costs and benefits of resiliency options in communities surrounding the Navesink and Shrewsbury rivers. It will include information, expertise and opinions from every town, and will identify independent and regional measures to improve storm and flood resilience.

The Two Rivers Council of Mayors works to resolve common issues in communities located along the Shrewsbury and Navesink rivers, and this regional proposal has been two years in the making. We will keep everyone informed as the post-Sandy undertaking unfolds.

They evacuated the residents, extinguished the cause, and called in our Fire Department, snuffing out a threat to life and property.

Thanks to these two officers for this heads-up discovery and quick action taken during a routine patrol.

At the end of the month, the first chili cook-off to benefit the Little Silver EMS, hosted by the Em-bury Methodist Church, was a huge success, and the EMS extends its thanks for all those who brought their appetites, and chili, in support of those who help all of us in our time of need.

Looking forward, our volunteer Fire Department will host its annual Saint Patrick's Day party, dinner, and all-around good great time on March 12 at 3 p.m. at the firehouse. Check www.littlesilverfd.org for ticket information and details of this community event.

And the following week, our Environmental Commission will host Environmental Day at the Woman's Club on March 19, from 9 to 1. 
